ACT/SAT TESTING DATES & REGISTRATION DEADLINES

The SAT and ACTs are college entrance tests that some colleges require. Seniors who are planning to go to college and have not yet taken or would like to retake the SAT or the ACT test should consider doing so as soon as possible. The registration deadlines and their test dates are listed below.

Registration materials can be picked up in the High School Guidance Office or can be done online at **www.collegeboard.com** for the SAT and **www.actstudent.org** for the ACT. The registration process takes some time so students are encouraged to start early, DO NOT WAIT FOR THE REGISTRATION DEADLINE TO START THE REGISTRATION MATERIALS! Students should carefully check the catalog of each prospective college to determine whether the examinations are required.



Cyberbullying : Identification, Prevention, and Response What is cyberbullying?

Kids have been bullying each other for generations. The latest generation, however, has been able to utilize technology to expand their reach and the extent of their harm. This phenomenon is being called cyberbullying, defined as: *"willful and repeated harm inflicted through the use of computers, cell phones, and other electronic devices."* Basically, we are referring to incidents where students use computers or cell phones to harass, threaten, humiliate, or otherwise hassle their peers. For example, youth will commonly send hurtful text messages to others or spread rumors using cell phones or computers. Kids have also created web pages or profile pages on social networking sites making fun of others. With cell phones, adolescents have taken pictures in a bedroom, a bathroom, or other locations where privacy is expected, and posted or distributed them online. More recently, some have recorded unauthorized videos of other kids (or adults) and uploaded them for the world to see, rate, tag, and discuss.

What are some of the negative effects that cyberbullying can have on a person?

There are many negative outcomes associated with cyberbullying that reach into the real world. First, we have heard numerous examples of victims feeling depressed, sad, angry, and frustrated. As one teenager has stated: "It makes me hurt both physically and mentally. It scares me and takes away all my confidence. It makes me feel sick and worthless." Many kids who experience cyberbullying also reveal that they were afraid or embarrassed to go to school. Research has also found a link between cyberbullying and low self-esteem, family problems, academic problems, school violence, and delinquency. Cyberbullying victims also report having suicidal thoughts, and we are aware of at least six examples where youth who experienced cyberbullying ended up taking their lives.

Where does cyberbullying commonly occur?

Cyberbullying occurs everywhere across cyberspace, but it shouldn't come as a surprise that it occurs most often where teens congregate. Initially, many kids hung out in chat rooms and as a result, that is where a lot of cyberbullying took place. These days, most are drawn to social networking web sites, a fact that has increased the potential for cyberbullying in these online environments. Instant messaging on the Internet or text messaging via a cell phone also appear to be common mediums over which cyberbullying occurs. We are also seeing it happen with portable gaming devices and in 3-D virtual worlds and social gaming sites.


Why is cyberbullying becoming a major problem?

Cyberbullying is a growing problem because more and more kids are using and have completely embraced the Internet and Internet-based interactions. Many kids go online every day for school work, to keep in touch with their friends, to play games, to learn about celebrities, or for many other reasons. Because the Internet and cell phones have become an important part of their lives, it is not surprising that some kids have decided to use the technology to be malicious or threatening to others. The fact that there is a measure of anonymity, and that it is easier to be cruel using typed words rather than spoken words face-to-face also contributes to the problem. And because some adults have been slow to respond to cyberbullying, many cyberbullies feel that there are little to no consequences for their actions.

November was National Diabetes Month but diabetes is a killer that strikes at any time and to anyone. Diabetes is one of the nation's leading causes of death and disability. In St. Lawrence County, diabetes affects more than 8.2% county residents. For that reason I wanted to talk a little about the enemy that is walking among us.

An estimated 25.8 million children and adults (of whom 7.0 million are undiagnosed) have diabetes and are at risk for disabling and life-threatening complications, such as heart attack and stroke, and kidney, eye, and nerve disease. Another estimated 79 million adults have pre-diabetes and are at high risk for diabetes. Research shows that Type II diabetes and much of the illness and premature death caused by diabetes can be prevented or delayed.

Type I diabetes is an auto immune disease. The body thinks the islet cells are enemies and kills them. It usually strikes a family member who has a history of family Type II diabetes. There are warning symptoms just before it is full blown. Some of the symptoms can include thirst, frequent urination, dry skin on your feet, and itchy palms. Type I diabetes often requires insulin shots or an insulin pump to stabilize a person's glucose levels.

Type II diabetes in most cases can be controlled and even prevented with a proper diet and regular exercise. It has the same complications for our health as Type I. If left untreated, it can cause blindness, heart problems, feet problems, kidney problems, and a host of other problems. By controlling our weight and lifestyle, many people are able to stave it off. Sometimes pills are used to lower blood sugars, and sometimes insulin is needed. Oftentimes in the case of Type II diabetics, losing some weight and watching what we eat could lead to eliminating diabetes.

As we approach the new year, it might be wise to work together as a family with exercise and eating healthy. It is not just childhood obesity, but adult obesity as well that we should be concerned with. The New Year gives us a fresh opportunity to show a little more consideration for this machine we call a body. Let's try to fuel it better, water it more often, polish it up, and take it for a spin around the block to show it off a little more often. We only have one body and one life, and for the sake of those who love us, let's work a little harder to make it a little healthier year.
