FROM THE DESK OF . . . Suzanne L. Kelly

Dear Community,

First and foremost I must apologize for the recent scare to the community and staff of our district. Finding the error forced us to have several emergency board of education meetings to completely redo the budget for the 2013-14 school year. The cause of this situation occurred in the 2012-13 budget where the Adjustment (GEA) was placed in the revenues instead of being subtracted. The revenue section was carried over to the new budget and the negative amount wasn't found until the new state run sheets were received. GEA was created by Governor Patterson as a means for all state aided agencies to lose funds as a means to supplement the 10 billion dollar deficit in the New York State budget.

As you are aware our district relies heavily on state aid and could not exist without it. Costs continue to escalate and state aid continues to reduce causing potential harmful cuts to educational programs and staff. There are three options that we have available to bridge the gap: we can use fund balance, we can cut programs and staff and or increase taxes with voter approval. Unfortunately, a combination of all three is probably the best solution.

Each year we have been forced to spend more of the district's fund balance in order to close the gap. Currently we have over three million dollars which allows us to remain solvent for two to four years depending how state aid flows. It is time to ask all residents to reach out to our political leaders and let them know that we need sufficient funding to continue with our current levels of staffing and programming. Let your fingers do the talking by contacting <http://fairfundingforstudents.org/ongoing-actions>, click on "Fair funding for schools advocacy link" and let them know how you feel.

Although the calendar says spring, we have not reaped the benefits of the good weather. It is inevitable that the sun and fun must happen. Start to make plans for your younger children to be involved in summer programming. The school will be running a grant program for students in grades 4-8 during the month of July. Students will spend a half day involved with a wide variety of activities that are both fun and educational. Last year our numbers were low and we'd like for more of you to take advantage of this opportunity. The children got to cook, sew, paint, play Wii and various sports, create jewelry and many other craft projects. The day programs will again be available where children can be exposed to robotics, computers, Cornell Cooperative Extension and other opportunities. Watch for the permission slips from Mrs. Durham for the Summer Extended Day Program. Transportation will be provided at designated pick-up and drop off points.

See you at the upcoming concerts and or sporting events.

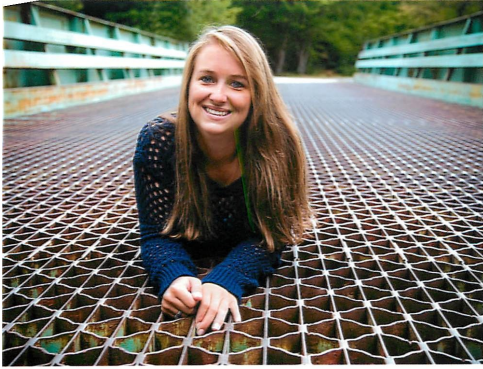

WORKING CARD APPLICATIONS OBTAINED IN THE GUIDANCE OFFICE

Please complete your working card paperwork in May or June if you plan to work during summer vacation.

Students less than 18 years of age who are employed after school or during vacations are required to have a Working Card. This involves filling out and having a parent sign an Application for Employment Certificate and having a doctor complete a Physical Fitness Certification based upon a physical examination performed within a calendar year. These forms can be picked up in the High School Guidance Office. A current sports physical or school physical (given to all 7th & 10th Grade Students at Edwards-Knox) is sufficient to meet the physical requirement. The school nurse can help with the completion of the Physical Fitness Certification for those students who have had a physical in school.

Students must submit the required completed forms to the Guidance Office.

We will do our best to provide you with the proper forms and knowledge of procedures, but getting things done in a timely fashion is up to you. Please don't wait until the end of June to start this process. During mid-summer there will be times when both Mrs. Finnerty and Ms. Alford will not be available. Be sure to plan ahead!

The Edwards-Knox Teachers Association created a \$500.00 scholarship to assist a graduate who has elected to pursue a career in education. The committee will make the selection based on scholarship, leadership, service, character and potential for success. The Scholarship will be presented during the student's senior year. To be eligible students must:

Be a graduate of Edwards-Knox Central School, Edwards School, or Knox Memorial School.

- Have completed at least the first semester of the Junior year by the end of June and haven't started the senior year¹.
- Hold a Grade Point Average of 3.0 or higher.
- Complete an application form.
- Submit an official transcript that includes grades for all courses taken.
- Submit two letters of recommendation (one must be from a college professor).
- Proof of enrollment in the field of education or teaching (course schedule, semester bill) for the fall semester.*

Small Business Management Competition

Mr. Remington's High School Small Business Management class successfully participated in the 2013 Business Concept Competition sponsored by Jefferson Community College in Watertown. The competition, held in conjunction with the college's annual Entrepreneur Day (E-Day), focuses on the promotion of entrepreneurship by encouraging participating students to develop their own entrepreneurial ideas, with the goal of enhancing the understanding of requirements to start a successful business venture. The competition also acts as a showcase of the creativity of high school students studying entrepreneurship.

All six students in Mr. Remington's class participated in the competition. Harleigh LeBarge, Hanna Hansen (our Foreign Exchange student from Norway), and Kiana Coffey developed a small business concept, called HKH Fitness and Health Center, that was based on a business model of offering a wide range of fitness and health services (including physical therapy, personal training, Zumba, body pump, and RPM, with a snack bar and child care services) in Northern New York. Kyle Gotham, Dylon Jeanette, and Kaden Dandrow developed a small business concept, called Action Replay Electronic, based on a business model of a retailer offering a wide range of electronic and music equipment (TV, computers, cell phones, car stereos, guitars, etc.), and also installation and electronic equipment repair services, regardless of where the equipment was originally purchased.

On April 10, both teams presented their business plan POWERPOINT presentation at JCC, competing against two teams from Watertown City School District, two teams from Indian River Central School District, and one team from Lyme Central School District. Both teams were very successful, receiving very positive comments from the team of judges, composed of professors from JCC, and local entrepreneurs from the Watertown area. The HKH Fitness and Health Center business plan was selected as a finalist, and competed for a 1st place prize of \$500 on April 19, during the E-Day Conference.

At the E-Day Conference, students heard presentations from keynote speakers, Jay Matteson, Jefferson County Agriculture Administrator, and Johnny Spezzano, owner of YO Johnny's Frozen Yogurt, and local radio celebrity who shared his exciting entrepreneurial story. Students also attended a Business Expo, composed of numerous businesses from the Watertown area.

The six students participating in this academic competition deserve our highest respect for realizing the great success in a stressful and intellectual challenging competition, and the accomplishment of the team of Harleigh, Hanna, and Kiana to reach the finals was remarkable, and a reflection of the exceptional quality of their academic efforts.

Dress Code

Reminder to students and parents about proper clothing and attire to wear to school, particularly as the weather improves. The complete dress code policy is located on pg. 16 of the Jr/Sr. EKCS Student Handbook.

The basic criteria used are as follows:

- No midriff or cleavage exposed/showing
- Tops cannot be lower in the back than 4" below the base of one's neck where the neck meets the shoulders
- Skirts and shorts cannot be shorter than the ends of one's fingertips when the shoulders are relaxed and the arms are held down at one's side
- In addition, no clothing or hats can have alcohol or drug references.

Failure to comply and wear proper clothing will result in a student being sent to the In-School Suspension room for the day or until a parent/guardian brings in proper clothing for the student to change into so they can return to their regular class schedule.

ELEMENTARY CORNER

These days, it seems like we hear a lot about testing in public education. Why are the tests so hard all of a sudden? And what should you expect to see when your child's test results are mailed home?

Why are tests so much harder all of a sudden?

Students are learning more and learning it earlier.

Workplace demands for today's students, when they graduate high school, are far greater than they were for us when we were in third grade. Manufacturing jobs more and more demand higher-level reading and math skills because of the complex machinery that does most of the labor once done by hand. Additionally, non-technical jobs inside and outside of the United States are competed for by people all over the globe. Some countries produce stronger thinkers, calculators, and writers than the United States currently does. Naturally, therefore, we have to responsibly adjust what children are taught, in order to ensure they are capable of being gainfully and productively employed as adults.

This explains at least one reason why third-grade tests look more like fourth-grade tests used to look. This year, students will take tests not necessarily having been fully exposed to the newly developed grade-level curriculum. This is for a lot of reasons, with the biggest being that state-provided curriculum has not been fully made available. While this sounds a little bit crazy, it's actually a *natural part of such a massive change* in what is taught, when it's taught, and for how long it's taught. The state has assured schools that all of its materials will be available in June or July.

What are test results going to look like?

You may hear some folks say that test results are not going to look good. And that is likely true; however, *it does not mean that students are not learning and teachers are not teaching well.*

Imagine if you were told you had to run a mile in seven minutes at the end of the summer. Every day, you trimmed down your time by five seconds until eventually you met your goal. Now imagine that you got to school and were told that you now have to run the mile in six minutes. Could you do that on the first day of school? Maybe, but most likely not. Could you do it by the end of October? Possibly, because you would have enough time to trim off five more seconds each day. Teachers and students are scrambling to make up that minute handed to them at the beginning of the year. The higher the grade level, the more minutes needed to make up.

So test results will be low, but they will be low across the state and will remain so for several years. We are not the only school going through these immense growing pains. The Commissioner of Education, John King, acknowledges this to be a *natural part of such a massive change.*

Here at E-K, we are committed to continuing to lower the number of students not reading at grade level. Additionally, in the next school year teachers and students will begin work with the new state-designed curriculum in English language arts. We will continue to tweak our new approach to math instruction as well so that each year the gaps in skills and understanding are smaller and smaller. In effect, we will keep working to trim off our five seconds daily to meet the new time set by the realities of our world. Tie up your sneakers and get ready to run.
