#### Dear Community,

Our students in grades 3-8 completed the NYS ELA Tests in early April. The three day process was well organized by the principals and their supporting staff members. It is truly amazing the number of times those booklets are handled, shuffled and counted before they are even scored.

This year our staff who scored the tests worked with our neighboring districts to complete the immense task. We have formed with Clifton-Fine, Harrisville and Hermon Dekalb to score all state tests including regents. This provides us with various experts at each level to over-see the process. With increased regulations and security surrounding these tests we must rely on our neighbors.

May, will hopefully bring us daffodils and pussy willows but it will also bring us the grades 3-8 NYS Math Test. The tests are aligned with the Common Core Standards which our staff has been implementing. Our students really have begun to better understand the new methods of teaching Math and many staff say they can see the reasons behind the changes.

Our budget continues to be the main topic of discussion at each of the past Board of Education meetings. We will be presenting the budget for the BOE's approval on 4-28-14 and doing the Annual Budget Hearing on 5-12-14 at 6:30 pm in the Media Center. The voter's approval will be sought on 5-20-14. A budget newsletter will be sent out prior to the May meetings outlining the budget, tax rate and other pertinent details.

The school year is quickly coming to an end and yet there are so many interesting events and activities left for our students. There is a Spring Concert, Prom, sporting events and field trips left to attend. It is important to remember to reinforce safety as the weather turns nice. A reminder of bike safety and late night driving to our children is imperative. Help everyone to learn from past experiences and not to repeat history.

The building project still remains on hold at the NYS Education Department. Due to position cuts in those offices the approval process has been drawn out even further then first anticipated. At last look there were over 300 projects waiting approval ahead of ours. We will keep everyone posted on this.

#### **Dress Code**

Reminder to students and parents about proper clothing and attire to wear to school, particularly as the weather improves. The complete dress code policy is located on pg. 16 of the Jr/Sr. EKCS Student Handbook.

The basic criteria used are as follows:

- No midriff or cleavage exposed/ showing
- Tops cannot be lower in the back than
   4" below the base of one's neck where the neck meets the shoulders
- Skirts and shorts cannot be shorter than the ends of one's fingertips when the shoulders are relaxed and the arms are held down at one's side
- In addition, no clothing or hats can have alcohol or drug references.

Failure to comply and wear proper clothing will result in a student being sent to the In-School Suspension room for the day or until a parent/guardian brings in proper clothing for the student to change into so they can return to their regular class schedule.

#### **Music Department News**

Each musician prepared and performed a solo with piano accompaniment for an adjudicator. The solos this year ranged from level 2 to level 6, and were from one page to sixteen pages in length. Four students performed a level 6: Karlie French, Catherine Curley, Darian Fenton, and Dakotah Bacon. All played extremely well. Congratulations to Karlie French who received the highest score of 95. Abbie Hale and Makenna Ashley performed level 5 solos and received high scores. The highest score for junior high band students went to Zach Scott who performed a level 4 Outstanding 27.

Catherine Curley and Lexi Hebb also performed level 4 piano solos. Many vocal students performed solos at NYSSMA. All vocal solos performed were either level 5 or 6. Performing at NYSSMA this year were: Alexa White, Lexi Hebb, Jada Flanagan, Anisa Hotaling, Haven Gotham, and Kara Davis. All performances were of excellent quality. It is very clear that Edwards-Knox will be well-represented next year at Area All-State, All-County High School and Jr. High All-County Bands and Choruses.

The first Spring concert will be held on **Wednesday**, **May 7**<sup>th</sup> **at 7:00**. The High School Concert Band, Jazz Ensemble, Jr. High Band, Stage Band, and various vocal solos will be featured. Our Second Spring concert will be held on **Tuesday**, **May 20**<sup>th</sup> **at 7:00**, and will feature the High School and Junior High Choruses, as well as the 5<sup>th</sup> grade band, 6<sup>th</sup> grade band, and 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade chorus.

#### What To Do If Your Child Is Being Bullied:

When children are involved in bullying, it is important for parents to be willing to take action. Children often do not tell their parents that they are being bullied because they are embarrassed or frightened. If you suspect you child is being bullied or your child brings it up, consider these steps:

- Talk with your child. Focus on your child. Express your concern and make it clear that you want to help.
- Empathize with your child. Say bullying is wrong, that it is not their fault, and that you are glad they had the courage to tell you about it.
- Work together to find solutions. Ask your child what they think can be done to help. Reassure them that the situation can be handled privately.
- Document ongoing bullying. Work with your child to keep a record of all bullying incidents. If it involves cyber bullying, keep a record of all messages or postings.
- Help your child develop strategies and skills for handling bullying. Provide suggestions for ways to respond to bullying, and help your child gain confidence by rehearsing their responses.
  - Be persistent. Bullying may not be resolved overnight.
  - Stay vigilant to other possible problems that your child may be having.

Some of the warning signs may be signs of other serious problems. Share your concerns with a counselor at your child's school. Ways to start a conversation about bullying with your child.

- Do you know what bullying is?
- Are there any bullies in your school?
- Have you ever seen anyone be bullied? What was that like for you? How did it make you feel?
- Is anyone at school mean to you?
- Does anyone at school leave you out of activities?
- Have you ever wanted to stay home from school because of the way someone was treating you?
- Who are your friends at school? Tell me about what makes them so special to you.


#### **Parents and Family Resources**

#### Field Trips

Each grade-level team of teachers is responsible for planning their own end-ofthe-year field trip. The activities may vary greatly depending on age and curriculum studied. The trips are meant to be a positive experience for everyone and for the group to grow together as a whole.



Some groups request a bag lunch be packed to help keep cost at a minimum. The cafeteria is always willing to pack a lunch for any student interested. These lunches include a sandwich of their choice, usually ham, turkey, or PB&J, a fruit, a drink, and a treat of some sort. The cost is whatever you pay on a regular day. Teachers do take orders for these lunches with each trip. If you pack a lunch, please do not send any glass bottles or any food that requires preparation.

#### **Safety Concerns and Summer Attire**



With the nicer weather we tend to get students wearing sandals. Please remember many of our students have to go up and down the steps to get to the cafeteria or other specials. It is always a concern when younger students are wearing flip flops and don't always hold onto the railings. Please keep this in mind as your children go out the door in the morning. In addition, open-toed shoes, flip flops, and open-back shoes are not safe for use on the playground. If your child does choose to wear shoes that are not acceptable on the playground, please send sneakers for the equipment and for P.E. as well.

Everyone is excited to wear shorts to school with the warmer temperatures. We ask that students don't wear clothes that are distracting to others. Our handbook provides guidelines for appropriate dress. As a reminder, students are not to wear halter tops or bare back shirts. Please also consider using the two-finger rule for straps on tank tops, which means that if the straps are less than the width of two adult fingers held side-by-side, the straps are too narrow for school attire.

If a student is wearing an outfit that seems inappropriate, they will be sent to the office. A discussion will take place and, if necessary, parents will be called. In the past, we have had students wearing shorts and midriff tops that were distracting to other students. If students are busy talking about what someone is wearing, they obviously aren't learning. Your help is greatly appreciated.

#### LOOP SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS

The Ray Loop Scholarship is available for anyone who meets the following criteria:

- 1. Is a graduating senior or a graduate of Edwards-Knox, or Knox Memorial.
- 2. Have an average of at least 85% or a cumulative average of 2.5 GPA
- 3. Studying Theology or a medical field (to be determined by the committee)

#### WORKING CARD APPLICATIONS OBTAINED IN THE GUIDANCE OFFICE

Please complete your working card paperwork in May or June if you plan to work during summer vacation.

Students less than 18 years of age who are employed after school or during vacations are required to have a Working Card. This involves filling out and having a parent sign an Application for Employment Certificate and having a doctor complete a Physical Fitness Certification based upon a physical examination performed within a calendar year. These forms can be picked up in the High School Guidance Office. A current sports physical or school physical (given to all 7th & 10th Grade Students at Edwards-Knox) is sufficient to meet the physical requirement. The school nurse can help with the completion of the Physical Fitness Certification for those students who have had a physical in school.

Students must submit the required completed forms to the Guidance Office.

We will do our best to provide you with the proper forms and knowledge of procedures, but getting things done in a timely fashion is up to you. Please don't wait until the end of June to start this process. During mid-summer there will be times when both Mrs. Finnerty and Ms. Alford will not be available. Be sure to plan ahead!

### EDWARDS-KNOX TEACHERS ASSOCIATION SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION

The Edwards-Knox Teachers Association created a \$500.00 scholarship to assist a graduate who has elected to pursue a career in education. The committee will make the selection based on scholarship, leadership, service, character and potential for success. The Scholarship will be presented during the student's senior year. To be eligible students must:

Be a graduate of Edwards-Knox Central School, Edwards School, or Knox Memorial School.

- Have completed <u>at least</u> the first semester of the Junior year by the end of June and haven't started the senior year<sup>1</sup>.
- Hold a Grade Point Average of 3.0 or higher.
- Complete an application form.
- Submit an official transcript that includes grades for all courses taken.
- Submit two letters of recommendation (one must be from a college professor).
- Proof of enrollment in the field of education or teaching (course schedule, semester bill) for the fall semester.\*
- All documents must be postmarked no later than August 31 to the following address:

Documents that are hand delivered must be dated and initialed by school personnel.
